I Can See Music

Do you find your art lessons at school uninteresting? Well, I bet you would look forward to them a whole lot more if you could actually hear, taste or even smell the colours you need to paint a perfect picture. Amazingly, some people actually can. This rare condition is called *synaesthesia* and it affects at least 4% of the population. Apparently, people with *synaesthesia* experience their senses in a totally different way from the rest of us. They hear colour, see music, taste words or smell numbers. (A) Not surprisingly, *synaesthesia* has often been **associated with** artistic creativity. Read on to see how this incredible gift has influenced the work of the following artists, past and present.

Wassily Kandinsky (1866-1944)

The talented artist Wassily Kandinsky discovered his *synaesthesia* as a young boy when he was given a box of paints by his aunt. When he opened it, he was amazed to find that each of the colours sounded like a different musical instrument. The way Kandinsky related colour to sound is clear in his work. In his famous *Yellow-Red-Blue* painting, for instance, he heard flutes, cellos and an organ in the blues and the high sounds of a trumpet in the yellows, while the warmth of the red made him think of a finale. **(B)**

Pharrell Williams

'I could always see what I was hearing,' says the American singer-songwriter, Pharrell Williams. 'For me, there are seven basic colours, and these correspond with musical notes.' Williams says that his ability to see things this way is a gift and is the root of his talent. He admits that without his *synaesthesia*, he wouldn't have achieved such fame. He comes up with the majority of his ideas in the shower. He explains that this is the only place he can use his imagination without being distracted by his *synaesthesia* as the water blocks out all sound.

Stevie Wonder

Singer-songwriter, Stevie Wonder, is probably one of the most productive musicians of recent years. **(C)** Despite being blind almost his whole life, Stevie Wonder is said to have sound-colour *synaesthesia*. When the musician plays his piano, he is able to sense the colour of each musical note in his mind. In other words, he can actually see his music.

Although a lot more is now known about *synaesthesia*, it has not always been that way. Many art historians believe that the famous artist Vincent van Gogh had *synaesthesia*. It is said that van Gogh took up piano in 1885, but struggled to learn the instrument saying that each note produced a different colour. **(D)** What a pity! Now we will never know whether he would have also become a famous musician.

ADJECTIVES

Adjectives are either weak (gradable) or strong (ungradable). We use 'very' with weak adjectives and 'absolutely', 'totally', 'completely', etc. with strong adjectives.

Cold is a 'weak' or 'gradable' adjective - it can be measured.

e.g.: a bit cold - cold - very cold

Freezing is a 'strong' or 'ungradable' adjective. It cannot be 'a bit freezing' or 'very freezing' as freezing already means very cold. Therefore, we say 'absolutely freezing'.


